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# MNBG Secures Garden Site for the Next 15 Years!

In 1976, when Rene Sylva was the caretaker of the Maui Zoological and Botanical Garden and began planting Native Hawaiian plants and trees, I believe it was his intention to create a legacy that would preserve these precious resources for their own survival and for our future generations to enjoy. He created a beautiful garden that surrounded exotic zoo animals for years and we are fortunate to still walk amongst these plants and trees today.

Over the years, his work has transformed into a botanical garden like none other in Hawai'i. Maui Nui Botanical Gardens is the only botanical garden in the state that features Native Hawaiian and Polynesian-introduced plants within a coastal sand dune environment. We are dedicated to conserving these species, some which are rare and endangered, and educating the community about their cultural importance.

For years, we have seen changes within the garden. However, one thing has remained constant and that is the County of Maui's support in understanding the value of preserving Native Hawaiian and Polynesian-introduced plants and allowing us to keep our doors open to the public

MNBG is situated on a six-acre parcel that is part of the larger Keōpūolani Park in Kahului. This area is owned by the County of Maui and managed by the Department of Parks and Recreation. In 2000, the County issued our non-profit, Maui Nui Botanical Gardens, Inc., a license to formally occupy and take care of the property. Since then, talented staff and hundreds of volunteers have dedicated their time in upholding Rene's dream. But what does the future hold for us? Will we always have this place to call home?

On August 4th, 2011, MNBG staff and board members witnessed a momentous occasion which we have sought for many years. With Chair Mike White overseeing the County's Economic Development, Agriculture, and Recreation Committee meeting, we sat at the edge of our seats as we listened to the Councilmembers discuss whether to approve another year of our license to occupy or to grant MNBG

a lease for the next fifteen years. It was exciting, yet nerve-racking, to listen to the conversations.

The Department of Parks and Recreation Director, Glenn Correa, began with opening comments and voiced the Department's support for the proposed resolution for a lease. There was interesting discussion amongst the Councilmembers and some brought up their concerns and expectations while Deputy Corporation Counsel Jeffery Ueoka helped clarify some issues. I was happy to be asked to speak before the Councilmembers and address some questions that they had regarding our budget and to once again thank them for their financial support over the years.

As a result, Chair White entertained a motion "to grant a lease of County real property to Maui Nui Botanical Gardens, Inc. for a portion of the Keōpūolani Regional Park known as the Maui Nui Botanical Gardens." The motion was moved by Councilmember Joe Pontanilla

and seconded by Councilmember Don Couch. Councilmembers Pontanilla and Rikki Hokama lead discussions to help clarify the difference between issuing a lease versus a license.

Committee Chair White proceeded and asked, "all those in favor,say 'aye". He then asked for "those opposed". We cringed and held our breath to hear if there would be any opposition and there were none! Within a few moments, the vote was finalized and the Committee approved a Resolution to issue a lease to MNBG for the next fifteen years.

This was a huge victory for the Gardens.

This 15 year lease will allow us to plant more natives, expand our programs, build on the property, and build more confidence amongst our funders as we work toward becoming a self-sustaining entity.

We'd like to thank the County of Maui once again for its continued support and commitment to our work. We look forward to being a great example of the County's achievements and toward preserving native plants and connecting our community to the Hawaiian culture. Let us all work together as we carry on with making Rene's dream and legacy, our reality.



## MNBG's Native Plants Beautify Market Street

Maui Nui Botanical Gardens is "branching out"! Earlier this year, we were approached by Erin Wade of the Maui Redevelopment Agency, a part of the County of Maui Planning Department, who asked if we would be willing to adopt the neglected 24 small and 14 large planters along Market Street in Wailuku town. The MRA offered to fund and install a storyboard about Maui Nui Botanical Gardens in exchange, and a new partnership was born.

We knew that we needed to choose plants that would thrive in pots with very little water and also wanted something that would celebrate the unique natural history of Wailuku.

In April, the Weed & Pot Club enthusiastically planted the 24 small planters on both sides of Market Street. The first two featured plants, 'ihi (*Portulaca molokiniensis*) and *Carex wahuensis*, were chosen because they prefer minimal water ('ihi) or could handle a variety of urban insults (Carex). We later added the indigenous fern kupukupu (*Nephrolepis cordifolia*), a hula plant that has astonished everyone by being both tolerant of vandalism and extremely drought tolerant.

The next phase of the project was to get the 14 large planters moved to the area between 'Īao Theater and the police substation on Market Street, which Goodfellow Brothers did very professionally. After Goodfellow Brothers helped us install low-flow drip irrigation, we planted a variety of species that grow within the Wailuku ahupua'a in the tall planters. This is part of an educational display that will include a storyboard and plant identifi-

cation signs.

Did you know that Maui Nui Botanical Gardens is part of the Wailuku ahupua'a? This ancient Hawaiian land division extends from the peaks of Mauna Kahālāwai (West Maui Mountains) through Wailuku to the glistening waters of Kahului Bay, and beyond to Kanahā Pond.

The headwaters of Wailuku river, also known as 'Īao stream, contain the inaccessible bogs of Pu'u Kukui considered wao akua, or a distant mountain region inhabited only by spirits. We represented this region by planting the endangered *Dubautia plantaginea* subspecies humilis, found only on Mauna Kahālāwai. We also planted the endemic lama (*Diosypros sandwicensis*), perhaps the most sacred of trees in ancient Hawai'i.

Further down the ahupua'a, the Wailuku River, runs through mid-elevation forests, which we symbolized with a red-flowered kōki'o 'ula (*Hibiscus kōkio*) originally collected from 'Īao Valley, a yellow-flowered 'ōhia mamo (*Meterosideros polymorpha*), and the wind-resistant 'a'ali'i (*Dodonaea viscosa*).

The sand dunes that surround Maui Nui Botanical Gardens and the drier forested areas around Kanahā Pond are exemplified by several species, including the endemic 'akoko (*Euphorbia celestroides*), the indigenous 'ilima (*Sida fallax*), the endemic hinahina (*Heliotropium anomalum variety argenteum*), and the endangered endemic dwarf naupaka (*Scaevola coriacea*), nearly extinct but still growing wild in these dunes. Also planted was makaloa (*Cyperus laevigatus*), to denote the wetland zone. Finally, the coastal zone is signified by two morning glory family species, pōhuehue (*Ipomoea pes-caprae subspecies brasiliensis*), and the rare hunakai (*Ipomoea imperati*).

Keep your eye out for the next phase of this project, the storyboard that connects it all together, and signs that identify these wonderful Hawaiian plants. We are excited to be a part of this project and so happy to bring these native plants home to Wailuku town!
